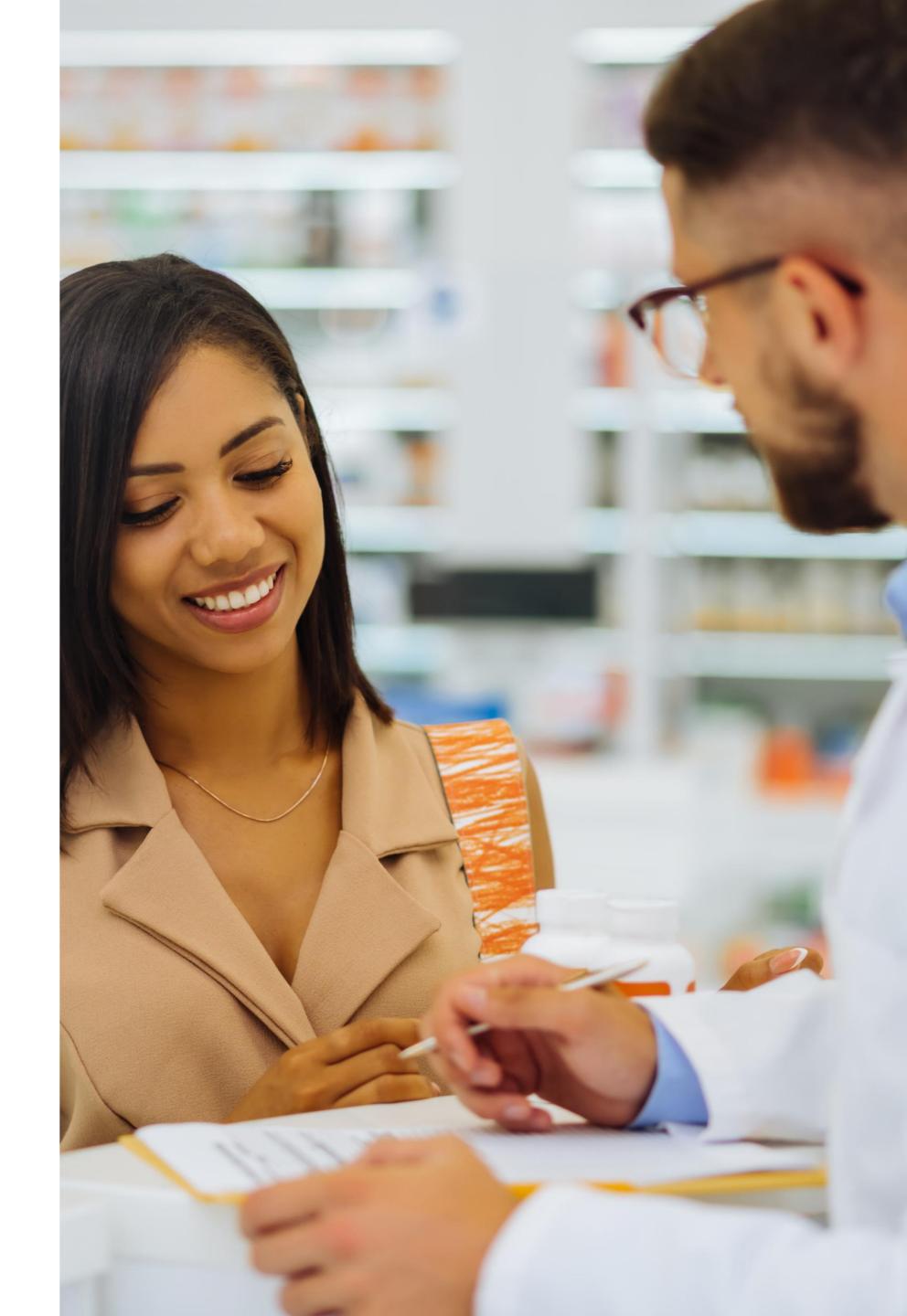


What is SafeScript NSW?



What is SafeScript NSW?

- SafeScript NSW is a digital health system that provides prescribers and pharmacists with access to a patient's prescription history for high-risk medicines such as opioids and benzodiazepines.
- Prescribing and dispensing information about monitored medicine is collected via the Prescription Exchange Services and stored in the NSW RTPM repository.
- Prescribers and dispensers using integrated clinical software will receive notifications to warn them when a high risk situation is detected.
- The Pharmaceutical Regulator within NSW Health will have access to the SafeScript NSW system and will progressively use the information to adopt proactive regulatory activities.





Monitored Medicines List

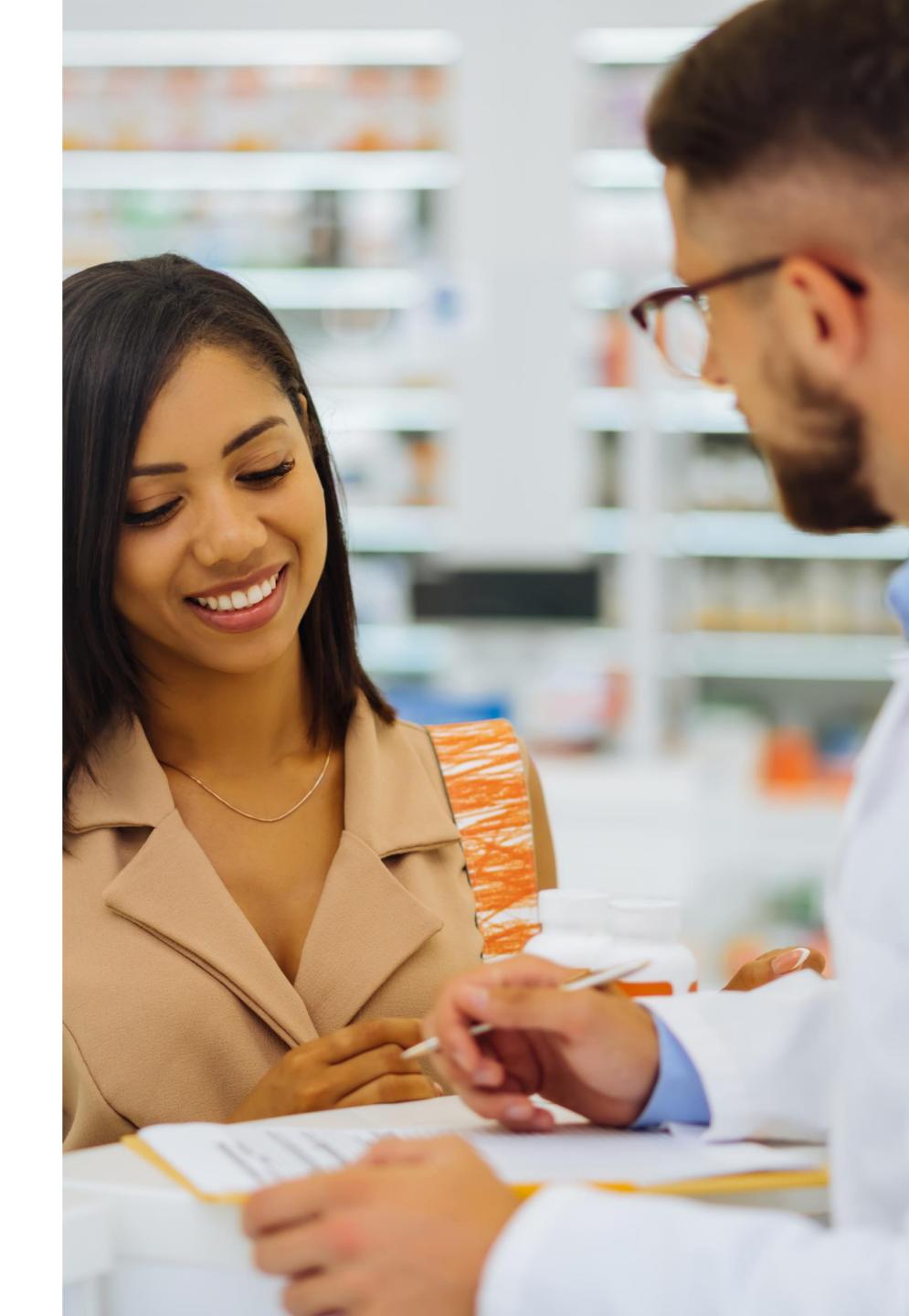
Category	Medicine
Opioids	Including but not limited to buprenorphine, codeine, fentanyl, hydromorphone, methadone, morphine, oxycodone, pethidine, tapentadol, tramadol
Benzodiazepines (prescribed for anxiety or sleep)	Including but not limited to alprazolam, flunitrazepam, bromazepam, clobazam, clonazepam, diazepam, lorazepam, midazolam, nitrazepam, oxazepam, temazepam
Other sleeping aids	Zolpidem, zopiclone
Psychostimulants (prescribed for ADHD)	Dexamfetamine, lisdexamfetamine, methylphenidate
Other	Ketamine, pregabalin, quetiapine All other Schedule 8 medicines not listed above





SafeScript NSW registration and use

- You should have received an email inviting you to register for SafeScript NSW.
- Once registered, you will need to make sure your software is updated and connected to the SafeScript NSW system. Information about how to do this is on our website www.safescript.health.nsw.gov.au
- Once configured, the SafeScript NSW system will operate in the background.
- When you are prescribing or dispensing a monitored medicine, a pop-up notification will display on your desktop based on information held about the patient in SafeScript NSW.





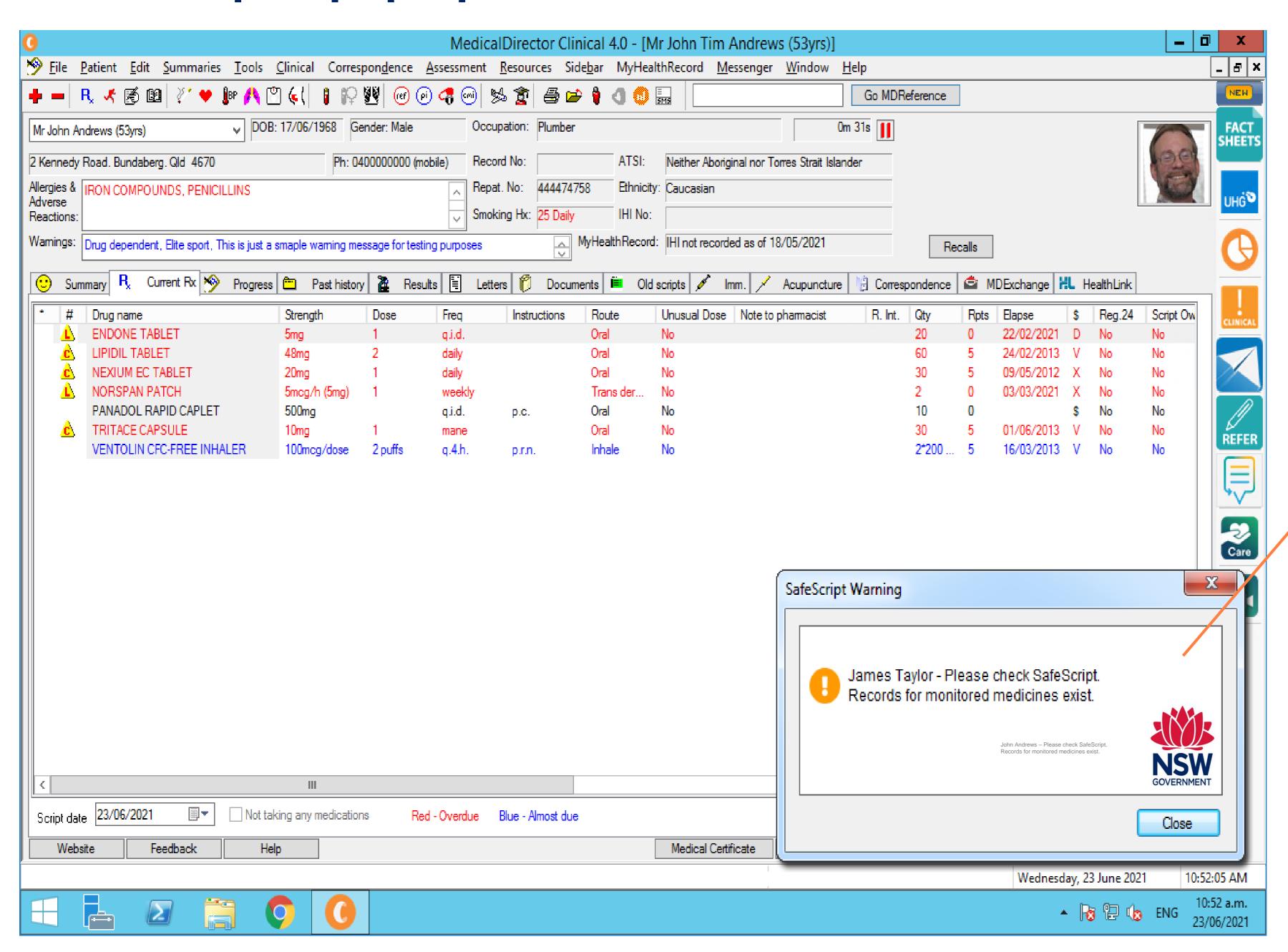
Pop up notifications

If you are using integrated software (such as Medical Director, Best Practice, Genie, Fred Dispense, Minfos and others) SafeScript NSW will send green, amber or red pop-up notifications to your desktop based on information held in the system about the patient you are treating.

Pop-up notification colour	Pop-up notification text
Green	There are no prescribing/dispensing records in SafeScript NSW for 'Firstname Lastname' within the last 90 days.
Green	Medicines prescribed to 'Firstname Lastname' within the last 90 days are from the same prescriber or the same medical practice.
Amber	Medicines prescribed to 'Firstname Lastname' within the last 90 days involve more than 1 prescriber at different medical practices. Check SafeScript NSW for more information.
Red	The medicines supplied to 'Firstname Lastname' within the last 90 days have resulted in a potentially high-risk situation that requires review. Check SafeScript NSW for more information.

SafeScript Alerts

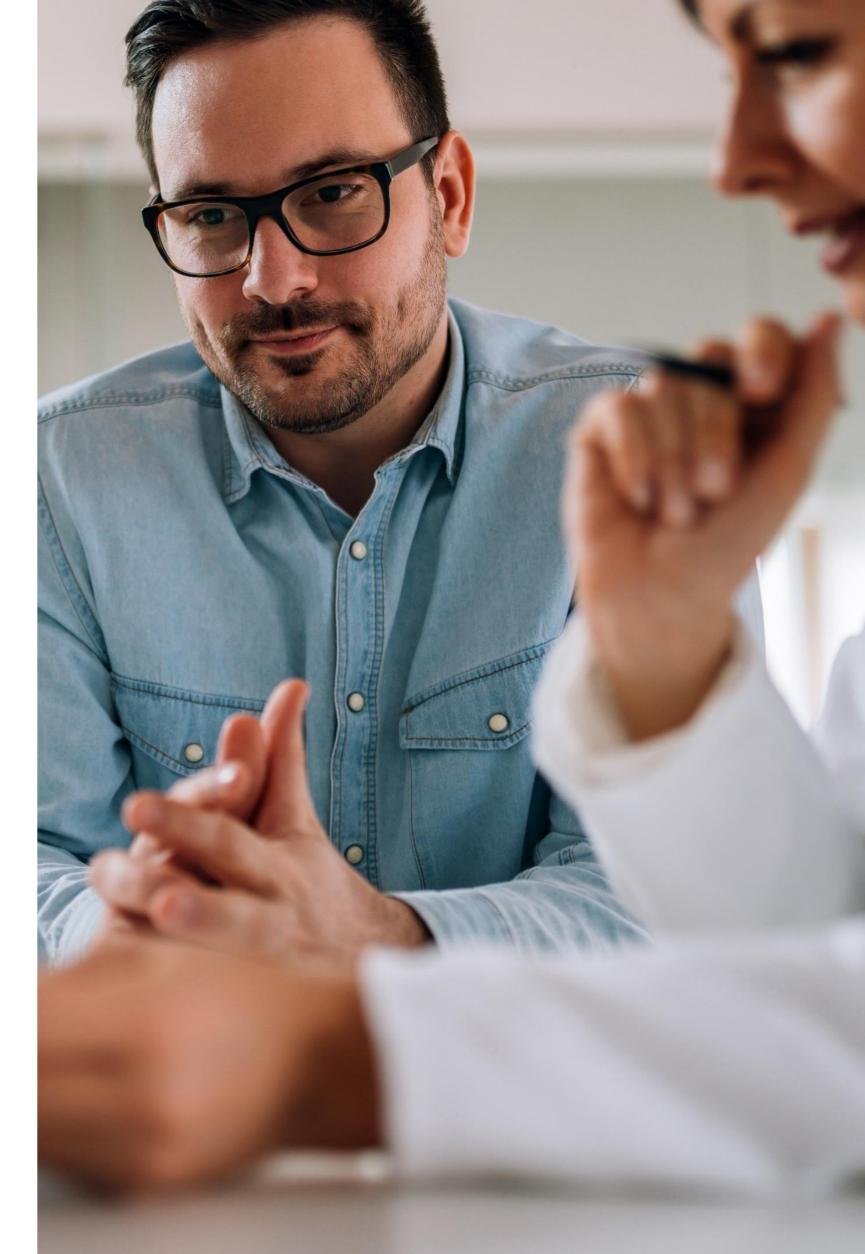
Alerts in the SafeScript system will be displayed where a high risk situation has been detected in the patient's record.

Alert colour	Alert rules	Does the alert trigger a pop-up notification?
Red	Concurrent prescribing of potentially harmful medicines in a 30-day period	Yes, a red pop-up notification is sent
	 Combination Rule 1 - Fentanyl + a long acting opioid (not OTP) 	
	 Combination Rule 2 - Fentanyl + a benzodiazepine / Z drug 	
	 Combination Rule 3 - Methadone (pain products) + a long acting opioid (not OTP) 	
	 Combination Rule 4 - Methadone (pain products) + a benzodiazepine / Z drug 	
Red	Multiple Prescriber Episode – this is where an individual has received a prescription for any monitored medicine from 4 or more prescribers across 4 or more medical practices in a 90-day period	Yes, a red pop-up notification is sent
Red	Opioid Dose Threshold – where an individual has an average daily opioid dose of more than 100mg per day, averaged over a 90-day period.	Yes, a red pop-up notification is sent
Amber	Multiple Pharmacist Episode – where an individual has had any monitored medicine dispensed in 4 or more pharmacies within a 90-day period.	No, a pop-up notification will not be sent about this alert. Information about the alert will be available in SafeScript NSW



Important to remember

- The alert from SafeScript NSW does not instruct you on what to do or whether a medicine should or should not be provided.
- This decision remains with you.
- SafeScript NSW will provide additional information and context to help inform this decision.
- You remain best placed to consult with the patient and determine whether these medicines remain the safest and best option based on the individual's health needs and circumstances.
- A number of clinician support tools and resources are being introduced to assist you.

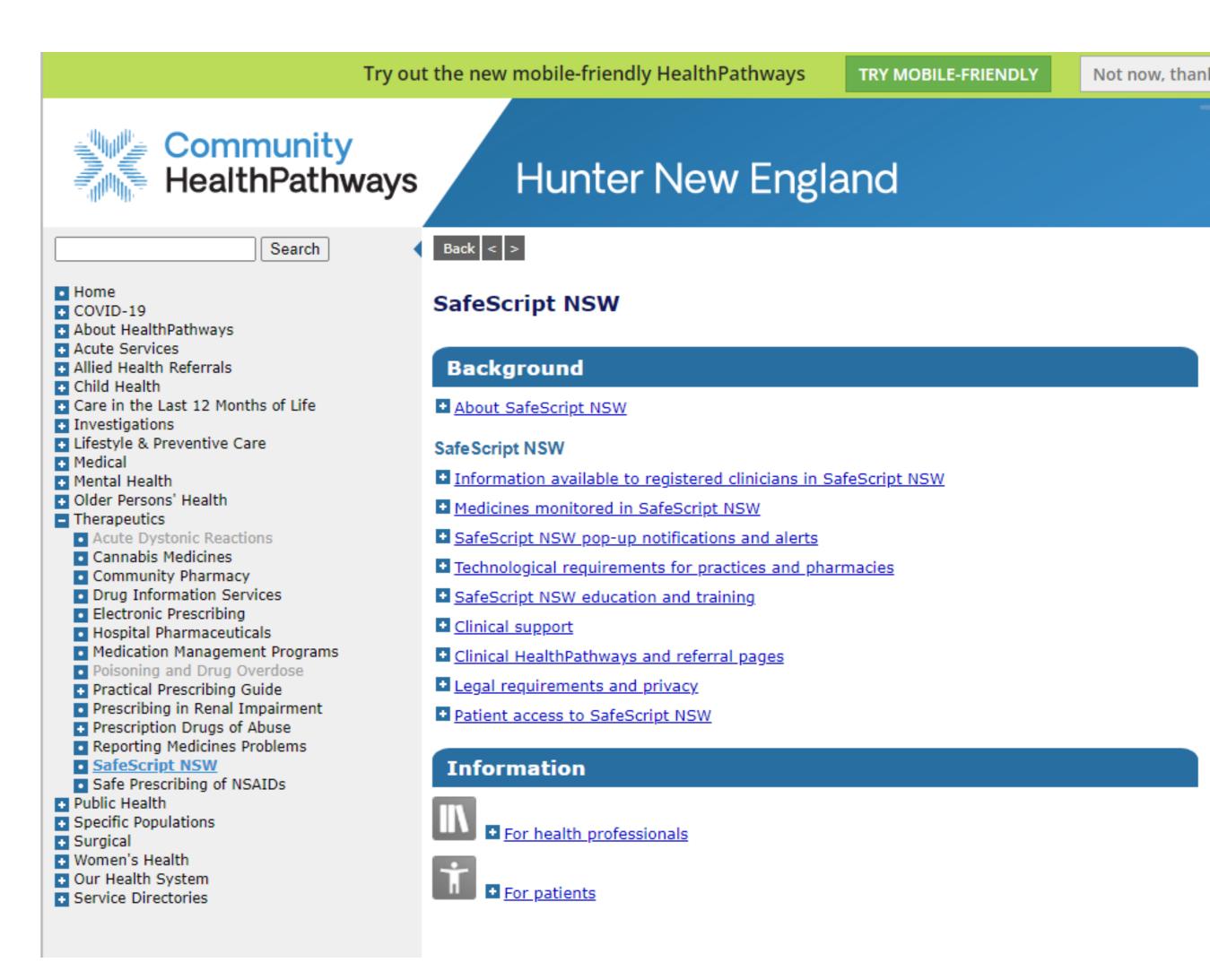

Enhanced HealthPathways

- HNECC PHN have created a core HealthPathway for SafeScript NSW that contains key information about the system and how to use it.
- The PHN are also developing GP and Pharmacy clinical pathways which will provide additional support and guidance to manage the patient as a result of an amber or red alert.
- The intent is to promote GP led care wherever practical, supported by appropriate allied health and other specialist services as required.
- The HNECC HealthPathways will be adopted by other PHNs across the state

SafeScript NSW Clinical Advice Line – 1800 434 155

A dedicated telephone clinical advice line will be established to support primary care providers. The service will:

- provide direct support to practitioners (prescribers and pharmacists)
 when responding to needs of patients who may be at risk of harm
- facilitate access to clinical advice for addiction medicine, pain management and mental health
- support safe de-escalation of high doses of benzodiazepines and opioids
- promote a transition to safer prescribing practices
- encourage inter-disciplinary management and patient focused pain self-management skills training where appropriate
- guide appropriate management and referral to other clinical services where required







Case Studies



Inherited patient - Janet

44 year old woman, patient of a retired colleague in your practice

'Dr Smyth has prescribed oxycontin for me for years.....'

You see in the notes she has been prescribed Oxycontin 40mg twice a day for the last 6 months, initially commenced at a lower dose in ED after extensive superficial abdominal burns 3 years ago and attends the same doctor and pharmacy at regularly for prescriptions

- No other prescribed medications
- Prior history of post natal depression
- Non drinker, non smoker, no other health issues

SafeScript NSW Notification

Red Alert - High dose > OMED 100mg

As a prescriber - how would you proceed?

As a pharmacist, you will also receive the red notification – how would you proceed?



Pain outcomes assessments: P.E.G.

Need to measure initially & regularly to monitor outcomes.

Takes less than a minute

New patient - Murray

49 year old man, new to your surgery, arrives late on Friday afternoon as walk in

'I know you're busy Doc, I won't take much of your time, I just need a repeat script.....

Asks for Oxycontin prescription 60mg twice daily

You check SafeScript NSW and see the following in Murray's history:

- Fentanyl 25mcg patch
- Diazepam 5mg TDS
- Oxazepam 30mg QID
- Pregabalin 150mg BD

SafeScript NSW Alert

- Red Alert Concurrent prescribing of high risk medications
- Red Alert >4 prescribers at >4 practices in 90 days

As a prescriber - how would you proceed?

As a pharmacist, you will also receive the red notification – how would you proceed?



Your patient - Abdul

'Hi Doc, just need my Targin.....'

60 year old man, well known to you, prescribed Targin 15/7.5mg BD for severe OA both knees and hips. Past history of recurrent lower back pain, chronic insomnia

SafeScript NSW Notification

- Red Alert >4 prescribers at >4 practices in 90 days
- Amber Alert >4 pharmacies in 90 days

You access SafeScript NSW and see the following in Abdul's history:

- Endone 5mg PRN for breakthrough (60 tablets a month)
- Panadeine Forte PRN (150 tablets a month)
- Diazepam 5mg nocte (50 tablets a month)
- Pregabalin 75mg BD (56 capsules a month)
- Targin 15 / 7.5mg BD (56 tablets a month)
