Funding, Training and Expectations across the pathways delivered by the College

- All pathways receive consistent education, training, assessment and support from the College
- All pathways require the same amounts of supervision and teaching based on their stage of training
- Training posts who have a registrar training on commonwealth funded pathways may be entitled to training post and supervision payments from the College, this is dependent on what stage of training the registrar is
- Aboriginal Medical Services who have an AGPT registrar are entitled to Salary Support through Services Australia
- Training posts who have a registrar training on self-funded pathways are not entitled to any payment from the College



ACRRM Training Overview

Four-year full-time training in regional, rural and remote Australia.

Core Generalist Training 3 years (MM2-7)

- Clinical training experience across a range of services including general practices, hospitals, Aboriginal and Medical Services and retrieval services
- Mandatory face-to-face education program delivered by the College

Advanced Specialised Training 1 year (2 years for Surgery)

- Choose from one of twelve disciplines
- Experience gained in hospitals, primary care or other health services relevant to discipline chosen



How to become an ACRRM accredited Training Post



Accreditation Benefits

- ACRRM accredited training post have access to a wider pool of registrars with ACRRM training across four pathways
- Registrars can spend entire duration of their GP placements at one training post
- Registrars are often eager to be involved in VMO roster as part of their GP placement
- Typically, these registrars bring additional skills to their GP placements, such as GP Anaesthetist or GP Obstetrician
- Often, they are looking to set up ties within the community where they are completing their GP placement



How can you support your registrar

- Practice orientation, BP/software orientation, MBS orientation,
- Reminder of NTCER; employment resources (e.g GPSA)
- Social things staff lunch or dinner to introduce to team / community
- Referral Pathways
- Overview of local health services e.g path, imaging, allied
- Be aware of registrar mandatory <u>education sessions</u>



ACRRM Supervisor Accreditation

Prior to confirming accreditation, doctors must complete the following:

- College Supervision Essentials online course or another supervisor training course
- Cultural Awareness course

Accredited supervisors can supervise an ACRRM registrar training on the ACRRM Fellowship Training Program on any training pathway.

Supervisors are supported, performance monitored, and a reaccreditation review is undertaken every three years.

Supervisors must be Fellowed doctors.



Requirements of an ACRRM accredited Training Post and Supervisor

Supervision

- 100% supervision for the first two months for registrars in their first primary care term (80% for remainder of first term)
- 50% supervision for registrars in their second primary care term
- 25% for remainder of the terms

Teaching

- Minimum 3 hours teaching provided per week for registrars in their first primary care term
- 1.5 hours teaching provided per week for registrars in their second primary care term
- 45 minutes teaching per week provided for registrars in their third primary care term
- AST teaching varies depending on discipline (for most it is minimum 4 hours per week)



Remote Supervision

ACRRM has recently updated its Guidelines for safe and effective rural generalist training using remote supervision

There are number of models available:

- Remote supervision
- Blended supervision
- Satellite supervision
- Group supervision
- Supervisor leave cover

All models require a considered supervision arrangement to be in place which is subject to College approval.

This plan should highlight emergency and non-emergency escalations during remote supervision and is not suitable for more junior registrars.



Placements

ACRRM offers a blended model when it comes to registrar placement. This model consists of two options;

- 1. A structured placement process in which registrars apply through RGHub
- 2. A guided placement process in which registrars are able to seek placement outside RGHub based on specific skills and/or interests
 - ACRRM's structured placement process occurs every six months.
 - During this process, ACRRM accredited training posts who have indicated they have capacity to train registrars, will be made available to registrars seeking placements
 - Training posts can also be confident they have access to registrars committed to working in rural and remote locations and can rely on ACRRM to assist with their accreditation requirements.
 - ACRRM and the RACGP are collaborating on a bi-college placement process to ensure minimal disruption to registrars and all training posts accredited by both Colleges

Friday 24 Nov	Medicare provider number deadline
