



The Impact – Outcomes-based Commissioning Process



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Clarity and Purpose

- All stakeholders were clear on what the modules were delivering and why
- Joint Aim and Shared Expertise
- Facilitators were able to justify the importance of recording outcome measures

Practicality

- Requires early involvement and planning
- Effective communication and collaboration
- Expertise around M&E tools such as PLM, Evaluation Plans and Codesign

The Impact – Acceptability and Impact of the Modules

Highlighted themes and what worked?

'Future activity planning should incorporate the outcome-based commissioning process as it was of benefit and valued by stakeholders. Earlier involvement of developers and evaluators may assist with ensuring that stakeholders share a common view around project outcomes.'
